What is Human Trafficking?

Modern Day Slavery.

It is a crime using force, fraud, or coercion to perform acts of labor or sex (personal or commercial).

Agriculture,
Construction, Servitude
(Services), Nail Salons,

Traffickers Use:

Threats, manipulation, lies, debt bondage to compel adults and children to engage in forced labor or sex acts against their will.

Under U.S law, any minor under the age of 18 years induced into commercial sex is a victim of sex trafficking, regardless of whether or not the trafficker used force, fraud, or coercion.

Trafficking versus Smuggling

Human Trafficking

- Victims are forced, defrauded, or coerced into trafficking.
- Actions of traffickers move them into labor, services, or commercial sex.
- Human Trafficking is a crime against a individual.
- Trafficking does not have to involve transportation.

Human Smuggling

- Individuals consent to being smuggled.
- Smuggling is a crime against a country and its borders.
- Smuggling involves the transportation of a individual across a national border.
 - Smuggling is always transnational.

Smuggling is transportation based Trafficking is exploitation based



Trafficking Assessment: A-M-P Model

Action* (Trafficks)

Means** (Causes)

Purpose

- transports
- entices
- recruits
- harbors
- provides
- obtains (or so attempts)

- Force (Physical assault, sexual assault, confinement)
- Fraud (False promises about work/living conditions, withholding wages)
- Coercion (Threats of harm or deportation, psychological manipulation, confiscation of documents)

- Commercial sex act(s)
- Sexual performance of a child
- Possession or promotion of child pornography
- continuous sexual abuse, indecency with a child, sexual assault and aggravation
- Forced labor or services

Texas Penal Code, Section 20A.02.

^{*}Additional actions that constitute sex trafficking, but not labor trafficking, include patronizers, solicits, and knowingly advertises.

**Neither force, fraud, coercion are required to be shown for minors under the age of 18 induced into commercial sex acts



Warning Signs of Trafficking

- Signs of physical abuse, burn marks, bruises, or cuts
- Unexplained absences from class
- Less appropriately dressed than before
- Promiscuous or sexualized behavior
- Overly tired in class
- Withdrawn, depressed, or distracted
- Brags about making or having lots of money
- · Displays expensive clothes, accessories, or shoes
- New tattoo (Pimps often use tattoos as a way to brand victims.
 Tattoos of a name, symbol of money, or barcode could indicate trafficking)
- Older boyfriend, new friends with a different lifestyle
- Talks about wild parties or invites other students to attend parties
- Shows signs of gang affiliation (a preference for specific colors, display gang symbols)


Who is Vulnerable?


- History of abuse, neglect, or domestic violence
- Family background of being sexually exploited
- Displacement by a social or natural disaster
- Part of an undocumented, stateless, or ostracized group, or inconsistent family conditions (e.g., parent absence or neglect, substance abuse, physical/sexual/emotional abuse, foster care)
- Runaway, truant, risky sexual behavior
- Poverty or economic instability
- Previous trouble with the law
- Any child or adult who needs or wants something they don't have is vulnerable because traffickers will step in to fill that need in order to coerce someone into "the life".

Grooming



Trafficker maintains control through threats, violence, fear, or blackmail.

Trafficker begins to demand a payment must be made for drugs, car rides, cell phones, makeup, whatever. Often, trafficker demands sex for such services.

Trafficker creates "time" to be alone & becomes a major role in victims life. Separate from support system.

Traffickers buy gifts, drugs, are a friend, whatever the victim needs them to be.


Traffickers take time to get information; blend well; often liked by adults & Parents.

• Why these crimes: The Profit


• 1 Woman/girl @ \$1,000/day

• \$1,000 X7 = \$7,000.00/wk

• \$7,000 X4 = \$28,000.00/mo

• \$28,000 X12 = \$336,000.00/yr

- 1 Trafficker w/3 women/girls can easily clear \$1,000,000.00 in a year's time.
 - Low risk and high profit
 - Annual illegal worldwide profits for human trafficking are estimated to be \$150 billion.



CHILD SEX TRAFFICKING

Of the nearly 25,000 runaways reported to NCMEC in 2019 one in six were likely victims of child sex trafficking.



In previous years it was 1 in 7



Of those, **88 percent** were in the care of social services when they went missing.



Entrance and Experience


73% of victims reported they had previously engaged in uncoerced survival sex



- Victims will immediately ask for help or assistance and will self-identify as a victim of a crime.
- Trafficked persons can only be foreign nationals or are only immigrants from other countries.
- Trafficking must involve some form of travel, transportation, or movement across state or national borders.
- There must be elements of physical restraint, physical force, or physical bondage when identifying a human trafficking situation.
